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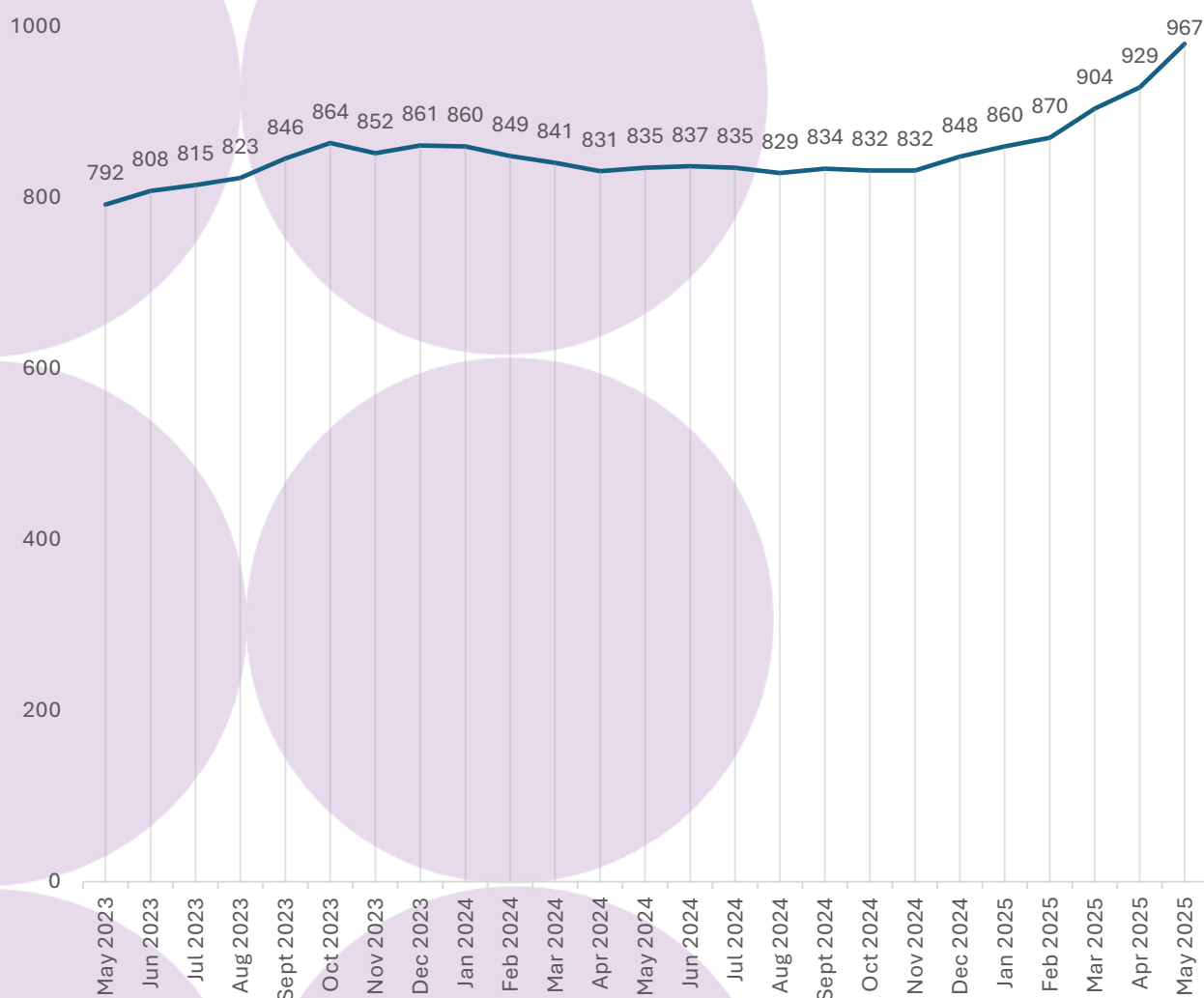

If had to compare leading a project team to captaining a vessel, what type of ship would your leadership style represent—a precise military submarine, an adventurous sailing yacht, a steady cargo vessel, or something else entirely—and how has that "ship" you-navigated the sometimes-stormy waters of project management?

I'd say my leadership style resembles an exploration-class research vessel. It's sturdy enough to navigate uncharted waters, flexible enough to adjust course when new discoveries arise, and built for collaboration among experts with different cultures and soft skill sets. Stormy project waters often require a mix of adaptability, resilience and strategic foresight, so whether the team faces turbulent shifts or finds unexpected treasure, we stay the course while constantly learning.

What's the most valuable career pivot you've made that initially terrified you but ultimately transformed your project management approach?

I strongly believe that the moment I started to enter deeper into the preparation lessons for the PMP certification with my mentor Giorgos Kyriakidis was the start of my transformation. I realized that my initial understanding of project management was incorrect and then transitioned to a more accurate and effective approach.

We all have project "war stories" - tell us about a disaster that seemed catastrophic at the time but taught you something invaluable (and that you can laugh about now).

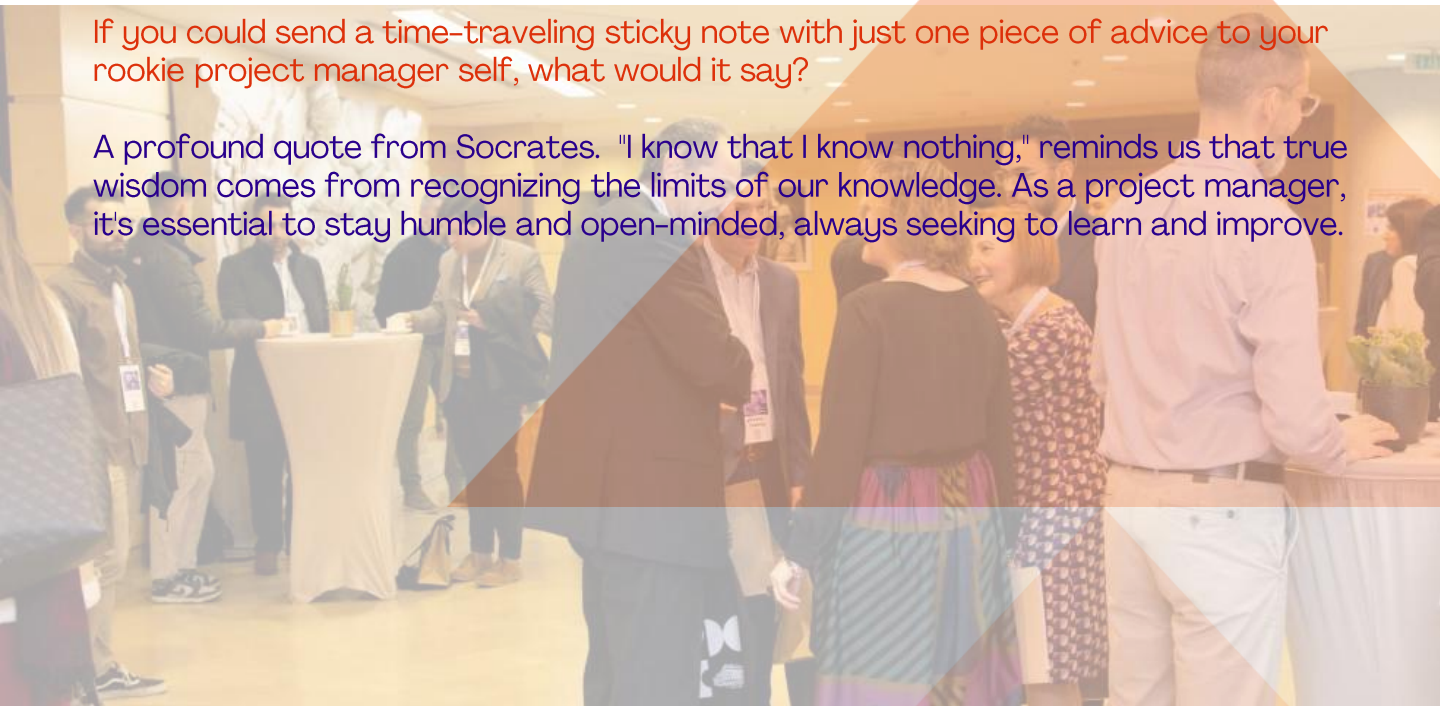
Amid a chaotic project, the team faced a daunting challenge: the scope of work was not fully detailed, leading to a series of unforeseen challenges. As deadlines loomed and pressure mounted, the team had to navigate through ambiguity and uncertainty. They relied on their collective expertise, communication, and problem-solving skills to piece together the missing details and deliver a successful outcome. The project became a lesson learned about the importance of clear communication and detailed planning.

Beyond the standard methodologies and certifications, what unconventional skill or hobby has surprisingly enhanced your effectiveness as a project manager?

Believe it or not Cooking has been a huge asset, can teach you valuable lessons in planning, organization, and time management. It also encourages creativity and experimentation, which can be beneficial when developing innovative solutions for project challenges.

If you could send a time-traveling sticky note with just one piece of advice to your rookie project manager self, what would it say?

A profound quote from Socrates. "I know that I know nothing," reminds us that true wisdom comes from recognizing the limits of our knowledge. As a project manager, it's essential to stay humble and open-minded, always seeking to learn and improve.

If had to compare leading a project team to captaining a vessel, what type of ship would your leadership style represent—a precise military submarine, an adventurous sailing yacht, a steady cargo vessel, or something else entirely—and how has that "ship" you-navigated the sometimes-stormy waters of project management?

What a powerful metaphor! I'd describe my leadership style as that of an adventurous sailing yacht—agile, adaptable and rooted in teamwork. I thrive in dynamic environments, approaching uncertainty with curiosity and steady confidence. I foster trust, collaboration, and shared ownership, instead of relying on rigid structures. When challenges arise, I remain calm, adjust direction when needed and lead with clarity and resilience. To me, leadership means empowering others, embracing change and driving meaningful progress—even in turbulent conditions. Like a yacht captain, I lead from within the team, staying engaged and focused on both the journey and the destination as we grow together.

What's the most valuable career pivot you've made that initially terrified you but ultimately transformed your project management approach?

One of the most transformative—and initially intimidating—career shifts I made was moving from project manager to team supervisor. As a project manager, I always recognized that team members were the most important asset driving projects success—but this was mainly within the limited scope and timeline of a project plan. Transitioning to a supervisory role expanded that perspective. It became less about deliverables and more about long-term growth, engagement and team well-being. It challenged me to lead with empathy, prioritize long-term development, and support the overall well-being of the team. This shift profoundly impacted my project management approach: I became more holistic and people-centered, placing greater emphasis on sustainable collaboration, emotional intelligence and creating an environment where high performance can thrive over time—not just during a single project cycle or even annual roadmap.

We all have project "war stories" – tell us about a disaster that seemed catastrophic at the time but taught you something invaluable (and that you can laugh about now).

One of my most memorable (but thankfully not disastrous) projects was a massive transformation initiative that involved not just a systems merge, but also a complete overhaul of teams and processes. At the outset, it seemed like the perfect storm: we had multiple systems to integrate, teams with different cultures and workflows, and processes that needed to evolve simultaneously. The scale of the changes created some serious friction. The teams were overwhelmed by the new systems, processes felt disjointed and communication across departments was all over the place. There were moments when it seemed like we were spinning our wheels—systems weren't aligning, teams were resistant to change and I was constantly firefighting just to keep things moving. In the end we made it, given the hard due date driven by regulatory obligations but we lost a lot on the way in terms of teams' moral and efficiency! Looking back though, that chaotic phase taught me so much. First, it reinforced how crucial early and consistent communication is, especially in large-scale transformations. Everyone needed to feel heard and involved. Second, I learned the value of flexible leadership—sometimes the best-laid plans need to be adjusted based on real-time feedback. The crisis forced me to adapt quickly, realign priorities and rebuild trust among the teams. And finally, I learned that transformation isn't just about systems or processes—it's about people. It was stressful at the time, but now I can laugh about how chaotic it was—and I'm grateful for how much it taught me about leading through transformation. It's definitely a war story I won't forget!

Beyond the standard methodologies and certifications, what unconventional skill or hobby has surprisingly enhanced your effectiveness as a project manager?

While formal training and certifications have given me a strong foundation in project management methodologies, it's my background as a school volleyball player that brought unexpected, yet invaluable strengths to my leadership style. Being a volleyball player back in my school days taught me the essence of team spirit—every play depends on trust, communication and seamless collaboration. Every player brings their skills and competencies in, and some days are not as good as others. Those lessons shaped how I lead teams today: fostering open communication, adapting quickly under pressure and always putting the collective goal ahead of individual agendas. Combined with structured project management tools, this team-oriented mindset has helped me build resilient, high-performing teams that thrive even in complex and high-stakes environments.

If you could send a time-traveling sticky note with just one piece of advice to your rookie project manager self, what would it say?

My note to myself would be short: "People before milestones—listen more than you speak, and the results will follow."

If had to compare leading a project team to captaining a vessel, what type of ship would your leadership style represent—a precise military submarine, an adventurous sailing yacht, a steady cargo vessel, or something else entirely—and how has that "ship" you-navigated the sometimes-stormy waters of project management?

If I had to describe my leadership style, I'd liken it to an adventurous sailing yacht—adaptive, collaborative and always tuned to changing conditions. Just as a yacht relies on wind, teamwork, and ongoing course corrections, I lead by empowering others, encouraging initiative, and guiding with flexibility rather than rigid control. In a fast-changing VUCA world, I prioritize creative problem-solving and stability in uncertainty. When challenges arise, I help the team stabilize quickly, then adjust our direction together once we understand the new reality.

For instance, when a project's scope suddenly doubled, and extra resources were denied, I brought the team together, clarified the situation transparently, and led a collective effort to reprioritize. We simplified where possible, redistributed tasks, and delivered the core essentials under pressure. It wasn't easy, but adaptability, trust, and shared commitment made it successful.

To me, leadership is about navigating change with clarity and trust, constantly adjusting the sails to reach our common destination.

What's the most valuable career pivot you've made that initially terrified you but ultimately transformed your project management approach?

The most valuable—and initially horrific—career shift I made was moving from optimizing existing business processes to building an entire operation from scratch. In my previous role, I worked within set frameworks, focusing on refining workflows with clear inputs and outcomes.

Transitioning into a business setup role was a complete change: I had to define vision, structure teams, align stakeholders, and make strategic decisions without a template. It was overwhelming in the beginning, but it fundamentally reshaped how I lead.

I learned to operate through uncertainty, make decisions with limited data, balance vision with execution, and develop strong ownership. Most importantly, I came to see project management not just as delivery—but as creating permanent foundations. Sometimes, the most impactful work isn't improving what exists—but building what doesn't.

We all have project "war stories" – tell us about a disaster that seemed catastrophic at the time but taught you something invaluable (and that you can laugh about now).

One of my most memorable project moments came during a supposedly product rollout with very few modifications—minimal setup, fast delivery, low risk. Halfway through, the client began demanding more: small changes turned into custom features, scope ballooned, and timelines unfolding.

We found ourselves building a customized solution under the same fixed budget that the client wouldn't revise. Internally, it was chaos—balancing shifting demands and limited resources. We nicknamed it the "Frankenstein release."

But that experience was invaluable. I learned to manage client expectations with diplomacy, advocate for scope control, and lead a team through uncertainty. We didn't hit the original targets, but by refocusing on value, prioritizing impact, and communicating openly, we delivered a successful outcome—just not the one we started with.

Beyond the standard methodologies and certifications, what unconventional skill or hobby has surprisingly enhanced your effectiveness as a project manager?

While I have formal project management training, some of my strongest skills come from life outside work—basketball, travel, and a passion for tech. Basketball taught me real-time decision-making and team synergy under pressure—just like projects with shifting priorities. Travel gave me adaptability, resilience, and cultural awareness—key when leading diverse teams. My love for gadgets drives my curiosity and comfort with emerging tools and systems, making me the go-to person for streamlining workflows. Together, these experiences shape a flexible, tech-driven, and people-focused project management style that thrives on continuous improvement.

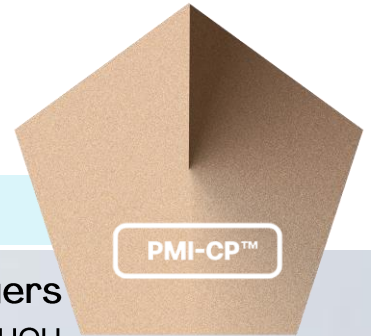
If you could send a time-traveling sticky note with just one piece of advice to your rookie project manager self, what would it say?

Trust the process... but build a backup plan anyway. Early in my project management journey, I put a lot of faith in plans and proven methodologies—and for good reason. A solid process gives teams structure, predictability, and confidence. But over time, I found out that reality always finds a way to challenge your plans. Having a backup plan doesn't mean you do not trust the process—it means you're prepared for everything might happen. It's about staying agile, thinking a few steps ahead, and creating room to adapt without derailing the entire project. So yes, I trust the process. But I always keep a Plan B quietly waiting in the wings—just in case."

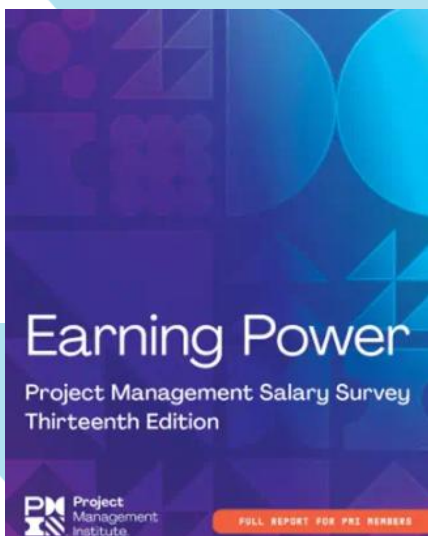
